Thank you for taking the time to write a letter of recommendation for your student for the 2018 SRF Summer Scholars Program. This summer internship will give your undergraduate student the opportunity to conduct biomedical research to combat diseases of aging, such as cancer, Alzheimer's, and Parkinson's Disease. Any insight you can provide regarding this student's ability to successfully complete his or her own research project under the tutelage of a mentor would be greatly appreciated. In particular, please comment on your own experiences conducting research with the applicant – experimental planning and data analysis abilities, skills you feel the student has mastered, ability to troubleshoot problems, and work ethic are some of the topics we'd find most useful.

There are no formatting requirements for the letter itself. Feel free to use your own university form if you prefer, but simple paragraph format is fine. A signed letter as an attachment is preferred but not required. To aid our sorting process, please adhere to the following naming conventions for the subject line of your email and attached file.

1. Email Subject Line

The subject line of your email should be titled "*student surname first name letter from your name*". For instance, the subject line for a letter for Greg Chin from Dr. James Watson would be:
Chin Greg letter from James Watson

2. Attached File Name

Attached files should be named as follows:

student surname_student first name_letter_your surname

For example, a letter for Greg Chin from Dr. James Watson would be named:

Chin_Greg_letter_Watson

Please email your letter of recommendation to 2018recommendations@sens.org by noon PST on Monday February 5, 2018 (12 pm PST 2/5/18). Your letter may be sent by another university representative if necessary, but a letter sent by the student will be disregarded.
